Study programmes

Cornerstone is an international English speaking Bible College for Mission Training in The Netherlands. Our passion is to prepare and train people to serve God in mission work.

As a student at Cornerstone, you will get the opportunity to learn from experienced staff and guest lecturers who have served as missionaries themselves.

We offer two full time, residential study programmes :

- + Certificate in Intercultural Studies (one year 60 ECTS credits)
- + Diploma in Intercultural Studies (two years 120 ECTS credits)
- For all of these programmes,

our aim is to fully prepare you for mission work by:

- + Stretching your thinking through the lectures, group projects and research work done at our mission focused library.
- Shaping your spiritual life and character, through our mentoring program, chapel worship and practical work.
- + Sharpening your ministry skills, and the 3 and 6 weeks mission internships.



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One year programme : Certificate in Intercultural Studies

The one year programme provides training for students who prepare for cross-cultural support ministries, short-term crosscultural ministry and for those who for other reasons have limited time for training.

The course majors on biblical and theological subjects, but includes also missiological and communication courses to develop basic skills in sharing the gospel cross-culturally. Also included is a three week on-site cross-cultural mission experience.

Our teaching programme has been carefully constructed in consultation with mission agencies and missionaries. We believe it offers the essentials to prepare you for long term mission. If you study with us for one year, than please realise that you will enter our one year certificate programme. There is no option to mix first year and second year modules.

Two year programme : Diploma in Intercultural Studies

The Diploma in Intercultural Studies prepares missionary candidates for cross-cultural work in such ministries as church planting, church nurture, support and aid ministries, 'tent making' situations, etc.

The first year is the same as the certificate course; the second year focuses in more depth on missiology, intercultural studies and cross-cultural communication. Included in the second year is an internship of six week hands-on mission experience in a cross-cultural setting.

Short Courses :

Most courses in the Cornerstone fulltime residential curriculum are given in modular form, with modules of one or two weeks.

A number of courses on missiology, intercultural studies, other religion and biblical subjects are open to people from outside. This offers an excellent opportunity for specialized studies to those who do not have time or the need to follow a complete Bible college programme. Short courses are also a useful opportunity for additional studies or refresher courses for missionaries on furlough.

- + General Education & Course Evaluation.


Credit system & requirements for achieving credits

Cornerstone is a member of and accredited by the European Council for Theological Education (ECTE – www.ecte.eu) – formerly EEAA. It uses the European Credit Transfer System (ECTS).

1 ECTS credit equals 28 (clock) hours of learning activities.

ECTS credits are allocated to all learning activities within the study programme, not just to the contact hours with the lecturer. This means that learning activities like private study, writing of assignments, ministry programmes, internships, mentoring programme, are also included in ECTS credit counting.

The course description gives the minimum requirements which have to be met to gain the credits for the course. This usually includes completing the main assignments with an overall grade of 50%, as well as attending the class contact hours.

Accreditation & Quality assurance

ECTE accreditation

Cornerstone is registered as an institution for Higher Education (www.internationalstudy.nl), but a Certificate or Diploma of Higher Education, do not have a legal status within the Dutch education system. This means that no Dutch student grants are provided and your Cornerstone qualification does not guarantee entry into further study programmes in The Netherlands.

However, our Certificate and Diploma programme are accredited and recognized by the European Council for Theological Education (ECTE – www.ecte.eu) – formerly EEAA. This means that Cornerstone complies with all the quality requirements of the ECTE. Every year the ECTE demands a written report on our study programme, facilities, staff qualifications, etc. Every five years, Cornerstone is inspected by a visiting

Code of conduct

Cornerstone also complies with the Code of Conduct International Student in Higher Education, to which all Dutch Universities and other Institutions of Higher Education have subscribed. This code of conduct focuses on ensuring that students are informed timely, appropriately and fully on issues like finance, accreditation, application procedures etc. www.internationalstudy.nl

team from the ECTE. This continuous evaluation ensures a quality control system which demands high educational standards and results in a programme which provides our students with skills necessary for the cross cultural work they are expected to be involved in after their studies.



Closely linked with missions

Besides the quality control of the ECTE, Cornerstone also complies with the demands of the mission organisation WEC, of which Cornerstone is part. We also receive inspection visits from WEC, who insists that the whole study experience continues to prepare students for the world of hands on cross cultural mission work.

Our training programme also has a good reputation with many other mission agencies. Our graduates have joined organisations such as: Wycliffe, OM, People International, AIM, ECM, Liebenzeller Mission, DMG, Frontiers, OMF, Interserve and others.

Internal evaluation

Also internally we keep an eye on the quality of our programme. Students evaluate every course and our academic dean discusses these evaluations with the lecturer. Lecturers also observe each other's classes and give peer to peer feedback. With the input from all these different angles, we continuously evaluate the content and quality of our study programme and adjust and develop our curriculum. The fact that a wide range of mission organisations accept the Cornerstone study programme as a good preparation for their new candidates indicates that we continue to reach our aim of preparing our students for cross cultural mission work.


Possibilities for further studies

It is important to point out that a Certificate and Diploma of Higher education do not have a legal status within the Dutch Education system. This means that our qualifications do not give a guaranteed entry into other study programmes in The Netherlands. However, the Cornerstone study programmes (certificate and diploma) do offer possibilities for further studies.

Both our certificate and our diploma are accredited by the ECTE, which follows the guidelines of the European Credit Transfer System (ECTS); 1 ECTS credit in the Netherlands, and thus at Cornerstone, equals 28 (clock) hours of learning activities.

It is our experience that students who pursue further education elsewhere are able to bring part of their 'Cornerstone credits' into the study programme. The level of acceptance depends on the level and the content of the course. So it is possible to approach a college and present your Cornerstone credits to see how they can be incorporated into your new study programme.

Cornerstone Staff

Cornerstone is run by a dedicated staff of WEC mission workers who feel called to the ministry of training people to be representatives of Christ in cross cultural mission work. Though all are well qualified for their specific jobs, staff members do not receive a salary but are supported by their churches and support groups. Because of this, college fees can be kept to a minimum. The college is led by a leadership team: Scot Fogle (Principal), Tiago Fonseca (Academic Dean) and Arjan de Waaij. The staff and leadership team are accountable to the Cornerstone Board.



Scot Fogle

(MA) trained in environmental science and worked in biology / chemistry in the USA before coming to faith in Christ at 26. He then went to serve a mission in Haiti where he met and married Lydie. He did an M.A. in Intercultural Studies at Western Seminary. Scot and Lydie joined WEC International in 2001 and went to work in France. Scot did outreach amongst immigrants and international students, and he helped plant a church. He was then asked into leadership of the outreach branch of WEC in France and then for the sending base until the end of 2018



Tiago Fonseca

(BA, BTh, PGCert, MA) is Brazilian. He has over 15 years professional experience in Marketing and Promotions, both in secular and Christian circles. He has completed missions training at Cornerstone, served with WEC in Senegal and worked as the Communications Director and Young Adults Pastor of Quinta Igreja, a large Presbyterian church in Brazil. Tiago teaches Bible courses and Intercultural Communication. He currently serves as Academic Dean and head of Public Relations.



Arjan de Waaij

has a background in Mechanical Engineering. In 2006 he coordinated the building of a primary school in Zambia. From 2008-2010 he studied at Cornerstone and together with his wife and kids he spent five years in Burkina Faso and Mali. He was involved in church-planting and he set up a community center with a recording studio for radio programs. He joined Cornerstone staff in 2017 and is involved in teaching and in maintenance. BIRGIT HERPPICH - GERMANY (PHD, MA ICS)

Birgit studied Intercultural Studies at Fuller Theological Seminary in the USA. She now works at Fuller as Affiliate Assistant Professor of Intercultural Studies teaching Missiology classes.

Since 1992, Birgit has been a missionary with WEC International. Between 1993-2001 she worked in Ghana, predominantly training leaders and organising the children's ministry with the Evangelical Church.

Since 2015 Birgit is the International Membership Department Coordinator in WEC, guiding and supporting leaders in over 20 countries in their task of preparing new missionaries joining WEC. At Cornerstone, she teaches leadership.

Uwe Hutter, Germany (Th.M, D.Div.)

Uwe Hutter studied Theology at STH, Basel, Switzerland from 1978-1983. He Worked 2 years for the Geneva Bible Societies translating parts of the NT from Greek to German. Since 1986 he is a missionary with WEC International in Spain working with three church planting projects in and around Madrid. From 1993 to 2015 he was a professor at SEFOVAN Bible Institute in Madrid, teaching OT, Hebrew (modern and old), Angelology, Christology and Contemporary Theology. Colin is currently engaged in part-time doctoral research into contemporary Sufi Islam in the West. Colin worked briefly in France and Sudan with OM in the 1980s. For thirty years, he worked with WEC in Chad involved in outreach, disciplemaking and Bible translation.

Still with WEC, but located in the UK, he is working amongst Muslims and teaching others to do so. He is the author of five books on the topic of outreach to Muslims. He is married to Jean and they have three children and three grandchildren.

J.G, GERMANY (M.TH.)

J. studied theology in Basel (STH) and after a short pastorate in Switzerland continued training at All Nations Christians College (Postgraduate Diploma in Mission). J. was involved in Bible translation (NT, AT) until 2019 and contributed to media related projects. As branch leader for a few years and for Bible translation he often travelled to the Middle East. Now Area Directors for the Middle East and North Africa, he and his wife regularly visit teams across this region. At Cornerstone, he teaches the 'History of Mission'.

PHILIP SUMPTER - ENGLAND/GERMANY (PHD)

Philip did a BA in Cultural Anthropology at the University of Wales, Lampeter, before going on to do an MA and then a PhD in Old Testament at the University of Gloucestershire, UK. He wrote his PhD while living in Bonn, Germany, where he was also able to interact with the German tradition of Biblical scholarship.

Philip has been a missionary with the Vereinigte Deutsche Missionshilfe (VDM) since 2016. He has spent four years altogether serving among Arab Christians in Nazareth, Israel, as both a theological scholar and educator as well as an English teacher in a socially disadvantaged Arab village. Since returning to Germany with his family in 2019 he has continued to serve among Arabs and in theological education.

At Cornerstone he teaches parts of Cultural Anthropology, Prophecy and Fulfilment in Isaiah, and Genesis 1–11.

MICHAEL HALLER, SWITZERLAND (MTH)

Michael studied Theology at STH Basel, Switzerland, continued with Arabic and Islamic studies at the University of Zurich, Switzerland and at an Arabic language school in Amman, Jordan (certificate). He also undertook doctoral studies at ETF Leuven, Belgium.

Michael lectures in World religions and Missions at IGW International, ISTL International and SBT Beatenberg, Switzerland. Having grown up in Cameroon he served as pastor of an international church in the Middle East for seven years and now fills various teaching and leading roles with WEC International. He is married and lives with his wife and three children in Switzerland.


FEEDBACK

Campus Accommodation & Facilities



YOUR ROOM

We provide accommodation for our full time students during term time. In holiday times you can request to continue to make use of your room, but you will need to pay for this separately. Cornerstone is situated in the buildings of a former convent and primary school building. Accommodation at Cornerstone, for families, couples or singles, can be described as comfortable, but not luxurious!

First year students will normally share a room and we try to team you up with someone from a different nationality. In the second year, single students would usually have a room on their own. Families will have an apartment of their own, which normally does not include private bathroom facilities.

There are different sections for single men, single ladies, couples and families. Each section has a shared living room/ kitchen area and bathroom block. Men and women are free to meet in communal public rooms, but should not spend time in private rooms of single students.

Pillows and bed linen are provided by the college, but you have to wash it yourself, together with your private washing. This can be done in our laundry facility. You are charged for each time you use the washing machines.

Please note that you cannot stay in campus accommodation after you have finished your studies at Cornerstone. You will need to make arrangements well in advance, especially if you no longer have your own home to return to.





MEALS

During the week, breakfast, a hot meal lunch and a simple evening meal are provided in the communal dining room of the college. The food we provide aims to give everyone the basic necessities. We do not cater for special diets.

Families are provided with supplies to allow for breakfast to be eaten in their own area. At the weekend, the central kitchen is closed. You are provided with food to make your own breakfast and evening meal. Frozen meals are also provided for you to heat up.

In holidays, breaks and during your mission internships, no meals are provided.



BICYCLES & CARS

Cornerstone can be reached by public transport, but the bus service from the train station is not frequent. Many students bring or buy their own bikes, but college also provides several bikes for a small charge per day.

Cornerstone also has three cars. If you want to make use of these, you will have to have a valid driving license and you will also have to pass the 'Cornerstone driving test'. Private use of the college cars is charged per kilometre. Non-EU/EFTA licenses are normally only valid for 6 months in The Netherlands. Having an international driving license does not change this

LAUNDRY FACILITIES

The college has a central laundry room, with several washing machines, dryers and space to hang out your clothes to dry. You are charged for each time you use the machines. You have to wash your own private laundry and also the bed linen you use at Cornerstone.



INTERNET & COMPUTERS

Every student room at Cornerstone has an internet connection socket for a broadband internet connection. Usage of this internet connection is included in the fees.

Most students bring their own laptop to Cornerstone and in the college we have a wireless LAN connection. For those who do not have a private computer, several computers are available in our library, which also includes network printing facilities.

RECREATION & SPORTS

The college campus has many opportunities for you to play sports and to relax. Outside on the lawns at the back of the College there is space to play football and volleyball. Indoors, we have a TV lounge with an indoor football game, a pool & darts room with a table tennis table, and a gym. In the gym room you can find fitness materials like indoor bikes and weights equipment.

In Beugen and surrounding towns, you can find opportunity for: swimming, horse riding, football (soccer), tennis, volleyball, basketball, etc.








Families & Children

FAMILY LIFE

We warmly invite families to come and study at Cornerstone. Many families with children have studied with us and have appreciated the facilities that are available. You will have an apartment of your own, but in most cases this does not include private bathroom or kitchen facilities.

Living in a community brings challenges both for families and those without children. It is good to realise that as a family it will take some time to adapt to the Cornerstone rhythm of life. Your time at Cornerstone can be a very enriching experience for your children and will present the opportunity to prepare for cross-cultural mission work, as a family.



Adapted study programme

As a college we are committed to preparing the whole family for the challenges of mission work. We provide childcare to enable both parents to take part in all aspects of our training programme: academic courses, ministry, mentoring, etc. But we are aware that parents with small children may find it difficult to take part in the full training programme. Therefore, we offer the possibility of a special "Parents' Programme".

Normally this Parents' Programme means that one parent does the full programme and the other does at least 50% of all the courses. If this is done for a period of two years, one parent will gain a diploma and the other a certificate.

We stress that aiming to attain less than 50% of the credits is normally not an option for any of our students. To comply with Dutch visa regulations, parents from non-European countries are not allowed to do less than half the required study programme (i.e. attain 30 ECTS in one school-year). And because of our commitment of training the whole family for mission work, we as a college have the same expectation for EU students. If you would like to discuss the options for a Parents' Programme, please indicate this in the application process, so we can put you in touch with our Academic Dean.

Because staff is not paid a salary, the fees mainly cover the cost for accommodation, food and study facilities. This means that we cannot give a discount for parents who decide not to take part in the full training programme.



Child care facilities

Cornerstone offers childcare facilities for parents who are taking part in the study programme.

Child care is offered for children between 1 - 4 years old, at the following times on the right.

The children are looked after by volunteers who supervised by a staff member. The children are looked after in the Cornerstone Child Care Centre and will be offered a daily programme, of play, singing, crafts and outdoor play time.

Beside the childcare centre, our indoor facilities include a play room with slide and climbing castle. Outdoors there is much space for children to run around and they can make use of our trampoline, a playhouse, and a playground with swings.

Normally, there is no child care for babies less than one year old. Children from the age of four go to the local primary school in Beugen, which is free of charge, except for a nominal fee of about 40 EUR per child per year.



Primary School

The local primary school is located five minutes down the road. Though children of students only come for one or two years and some do not speak Dutch, the school always welcomes them and makes an effort to help them feel at home. Experience shows that especially young children pick up the language very quickly. The school caters for children from the age of four till twelve years old. Since this area of The Netherlands is traditionally a Roman Catholic area, the school has an RC background, though not very pronounced. They make every allowance for the different religious background of the Cornerstone children.

Secondary School

In the town of Boxmeer (15 min by bicycle) there are two schools offering all levels of secondary education: Elzendaal College & Metameer. The lessons are in Dutch.

Metameer also has a sister college in the village of Stevensbeek (45 min by bicylcle). In this school it is possible for high level students to enter a dual language programme. In the first years 70% of all subjects are done in English. The other lessons and also the final school exams are done in Dutch. Students who enter this programme are expected to gain an International Baccalaureate - Primary school: www.onzebouwsteen.nl

To safeguard the well being of all children who live on and visit our campus, all staff, students and volunteers must submit a police clearance certificate and sign the Cornerstone Child Protection policy.

Pregnancy at Cornerstone

Over the years we have lovingly welcomed several 'Cornerstone babies' into our community. At the same time, it is also true that the arrival of a baby will have an effect on your studies and possibly also on your fellow students. If during your time at Cornerstone, your family is enlarged by the arrival of a baby, we ask you to keep the following in mind.


Child Care facilities are not available until your child reaches the age of one. Home delivery is not possible at college, so you will need to leave Cornerstone for a period of time. This will be worked out in consultation, taking into consideration the particular situation you and the college are in.

All arrangements in relation to the birth (travel, finance, insurance, medical, etc) are the responsibility of the couple. There should be no expectations of staff or other students in relation to these practical matters.

We have accommodation for families of different 'sizes', but available spaces are limited. At the beginning of the year the accommodation is chosen to fit your particular situation, so we normally are unable to offer you alternative accommodation.

FINANCES

When you come to study and live at Cornerstone both parents pay the normal fees. To cover the cost of accommodation, food and other facilities, we also charge a yearly fee per child. For babies younger than one, the fee is minimal, for older children the fee is higher. Please check our full financial details for more information.

18.00 till bedtime	Made some Italian pasta! Nice to eat as a small family unit in our own apartment. Now we have lighter evenings Roberto can supervise the children on the trampoline outside. Once we got the children into bed, Roberto made for the library. He stud- ies better there. As for me, I got started on my reading assignment. It's a

Health insurance at Cornerstone

As a Cornerstone student you must have proper healthcare insurance. A travel insurance is not enough. Below we provide you with information and options, but YOU remain responsible for getting the health care coverage that you need. Cornerstone does not accept any liability in this matter.



1) DUTCH STUDENTS

Dutch citizens who are part of the regular health insurance, continue that insurance during their time at Cornerstone. We need to have a copy of your insurance policy before we can accept you as a student.

Please note that Cornerstone requires you to take out a travel insurance for the 3 weeks mission trip in the first year and the 6 weeks internship in the second year. Before travelling out we will ask you to hand in a copy of the travel insurance policy.

2) EU/EAA & Swiss students with EHIC

EU/EAA & Swiss nationality students may be able to continue to be covered by their health insurance at home. You need to check this yourself. You can then apply for a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) from your healthcare system at home.

Please note ! Your EHIC card does not cover all medical costs and it is YOUR responsibility to check this carefully before coming to Cornerstone. Before being accepted as a student, we need to receive a copy of your EHIC.

You can also get an insurance in The Netherlands to top up your EHIC coverage. Check out:

Please note that Cornerstone requires you to take out a travel insurance for the 3 weeks mission trip in the first year and the

6 weeks internship in the second year. This may be covered if you have taken out a AON or IPS top up insurance. Before travelling out, we will ask you to hand in a copy of the insurance policy that covers you for travelling.

3) NON-EU STUDENTS AND EU/EAA & SWISS STUDENTS WITHOUT AN EHIC

If you do not have EU/EAA or Swiss nationality or if you are, but cannot get an EHIC, we can arrange a student insurance for you with AON. You are not allowed to join the regular Dutch healthcare system.

AON does not offer a decent coverage during pregnancy. If you want coverage for pregnancy, we advise you to find out if you can take out insurance for this in your home country.

You will also have to arrange travel insurance for travelling to The Netherlands.

AON student insurance through Cornerstone

Cornerstone can arrange a special student insurance with AON, for one year. It will start on the day before travelling to Cornerstone and will end a week after the end of our school year.

It costs around ${\bf \in 680}$ per adult / ${\bf \in 1380}$ per child - for the whole year.

We will arrange this insurance for you. You can NOT do this directly at the site of AON.

We will deduct the cost for the insurance from your internal Cornerstone account.

Please note :

- + This student insurance also covers you during any travel or mission trips during the period of insurance cover.
- + Please check the cover on the AON website: www.aonstudentinsurance.com.
- + Please note that you are NOT allowed to work in The Netherlands.
- + Pregnancy only has a very limited coverage. Existing pregnancies are not covered.
- + For medical expenses as the result of illness which could be foreseen by the insured person at the moment the insurance contract was entered into, please check the policy in detail.
- + If you stay a second year, then the insurance will be repeated for your second year here.

To register you for the AON student insurance, you need to fill in the AON registration form. We will send this to you at the appropriate time.



Finances

Fees

The finances of Cornerstone are part of our journey of faith and trust in God. We are able to keep the fees at a low level, because we do not pay our staff. Just like most of our students, also our staff depends on God to supply their finances through the support they receive from their church, family and friends. The fees for 2025-2026 are:

Fees cover

Tuition & use of study facilities, food and accommodation (including weekends), and travel expenses to weekly learning activities.

Fees do not cover

staying at Cornerstone during holiday breaks, and other additional costs like: books, laundry, etc. Also the mission trips in the first year (3 weeks) and the second year (6 weeks) are not part of your fees. You will have to pay for all the cost relating to both of these mission trips.

Non-resident students

Because of intercultural training, students normally live on the campus. In exceptional circumstances it is possible to study as a non-resident student. Please contact us.

Debts & refunds

Transcripts, Diplomas or Certificates will be withheld unless all debts with the college have been paid. This does not apply to Cornerstone student loans. If a student leaves for any reason during a semester (half a year), the following will be refunded:

Up to and including the first 3 weeks : 65% of a semester's fee Between 3 weeks – and 2 months: 35% of a semester's fee After that : no refund



Bursaries

At Cornerstone we highly value the rich cultural mix of our college community. We are convinced that the best way to prepare for cross cultural work is to study, eat, work, and live with people of many different cultures. We hope that our bursaries will help to maintain this cultural mix. The awarding of a bursary is not guaranteed and depends on funds available. If you want to help us support our students financially, see our website information on donations.

Bursary 1 & 2 are given to students who do not hold an EU/EEA or Swiss passport.

Bursary 3 : Eastern European Bursary

The board of Cornerstone has created an Eastern European Fund. Over the years we have received donations for this fund and we have been able to support applicants from Eastern Europe. The bursary covers half of your fees (for the first year of your studies only). If you have an Eastern European passport and are resident in Eastern Europe, you can apply for this bursary with your application.

Non-EU students

Students from outside the EU are required by the Dutch government to transfer more money than what we as college charge you. The total amount they require for you to transfer is as follows:

The amount that is left over will be available to you. We will require you to open a bank account in The Netherlands and will transfer the left over money to that account for all your other expenses.



Admissions

Entry Requirements

Our first level of entry requirements are listed below:

- + You are a committed Christian and can give testimony to your Christian faith and life.
- + You have been actively involved in a local church for at least one year.
- + Although there may be exceptions, we normally expect that your church supports your decision to go and study at Cornerstone.
- + You can accept Cornerstone's statement of faith (see page 3).
- + You have decided to go into cross cultural mission work, or are seriously considering this.
- + You have the qualifications necessary to enter into Higher Education studies or you can give evidence that your life experiences have prepared you to cope with the intensive Cornerstone training programme.
- + You are at least 20 years old.
- + You can provide a police clearance certificate.

Level of English

- + Native English speakers & those educated in English: if you are a native English speaker, there are no additional requirements. If you can show that your school education has been through the medium of the English language, please contact us.
- + Dutch nationals: if you are Dutch you will be able to demonstrate your level of English during your interview at Cornerstone. During your visit you may also be required to sit an English test. Depending on the result, we will let you know whether you need further English study before coming.
- + All other nationalities: if you do not fall into the two categories described above, Dutch government regulations require that you send us a copy of an official certificate which shows that your English is at the IELTS level 6.0 or equivalent (see table below)*.

If you are unsure about any of the requirements, please contact us so that we can explain them to you. (*Some end of school exams are accepted as well. Contact us for details.)

Application procedures

For 1st and 2nd Year programmes

Please note: If you are still studying for an English exam, we advise you to start the application procedure before taking your English exam to ensure we have enough time to process your application. The result of the English exam needs to be given to us in by 15th June at the latest

+ YOU complete your application form (including your personal Christian testimony and medical information) and send it to us, together with the following:

Copy of your passport

A digital profile photo (similar to a passport photo) with a neutral background.

Copies of your qualifications

Copy of your English IELTS test or equivalent (latest by 15th June).

(In some cases, we will ask for a Medical Report from your doctor.)


- + WE contact your three referees, one of which needs to be the pastor of your church.
- + YOUR referees will fill in the reference forms online.
- + WE remind referees, if we have not yet received their reference.
- + WE contact you to arrange an interview either at Cornerstone or in the case of overseas applications we will arrange an interview in your own country or by Zoom/Teams
- + WE as staff will read your papers and after prayer and discussion take a decision on your application. If you are still working on your English, we can accept you provisionally.
- + WE send you a confirmation of the result of your application and to non EU applicants we send information about the visa application
- + YOU send us a copy of your IELTS score (or equivalent) if you have not done so already
- + WE confirm the receipt of your English test score and your full acceptance
- + WE send you (for non EU) a form in which you agree that we will register you with the local authorities and that we will inform the immigration department of your study progress
- + WE send you a form regarding health insurance
- + YOU send us a confirmation that you accept your place as a student.
- + YOU send us (for non-EU) the signed agreement form regarding the local authorities & the immigration department
- + WE send you an invoice specifying the total amount still to be transferred
- + YOU EU and non EU students transfer the specified amount to our account (non EU latest by 15th June/ EU latest by 15th August)
- + YOU send us a copy of your police clearance certificate
- + YOU send us the filled in form regarding health insurance & the necessary copies
- + WE send you a confirmation of the arrival of your fees and a proof of admission as a student at Cornerstone

Visa application non-EU nationals

Visa applications for non EU nationals must always be initiated by Cornerstone. Please do not start any procedures of your own. The Dutch government regulations lead to the following requirements for the visa application:

- + An international birth certificate.
- + If applicable, a legalised copy of your marriage certificate.

We believe that mission is rooted in the Bible, therefore at Cornerstone the study of the Bible and Christian Theology form the foundation of our curriculum.



- + You are expected to transfer 14,640 EUR to us before a visa is granted (this value is for 2024-2025 and is changed annualy)
- + (see finance section for more detailed information)
- A signed declaration that you agree that Cornerstone will: register you with the local authorities and will deregister you as soon as you have completed or stopped your training at Cornerstone. inform the immigration department of your study progress.

Please note: your visa is a student visa. If you are more than 50% behind or have stopped studying, we will inform the immigration department and your visa will be cancelled.

Once you are accepted as a student, we will send you all the information with an updated list of all the documents you need to send us.

Visa <mark>costs</mark>

We do not charge you for the administrative work that is done by us on your behalf, but we will charge you for the cost of the visa itself. You also pay the yearly renewal fee. If you lose your resident permit, you will also be charged. Visa costs change every year. Check our finance and additional cost information sheets and see pages 28-29 for information on the visa costs bursary.


Latest application date

How to get to Cornerstone

Travelling by car from within the Netherlands

From the A50, take the A73 direction Venlo. Take the A77 direction Köln. Take the exit Boxmeer/Beugen. Turn right. Go straight on past two roundabouts. Then take the first turn to the left into Hagelkruisstraat. Our building is on the left hand side of the street, approx. 100 metres from the corner.

From Belgium

From the A67 (from Eindhoven), take the A73 direction Nijmegen. Take the A77 direction Köln. Take the exit Boxmeer/Beugen. Turn right. Follow the direction given above.

Travelling by train

Take a train to Boxmeer - 7 minutes drive from us. Try to get a taxi hopper. If not available, phone the college (0485 369130) and someone will pick you up.

By air

The airport Niederrhein near Weeze (NRN), is just across the German border, and offers cheap flights from many European destinations. It is only 20 km away from Cornerstone and you can ask to be picked up by car by us (you pay for the petrol). From Eindhoven airport (EIN) and from Amsterdam Schiphol Airport (AMS) Cornerstone can be reached by train (see above)
